If partners and stakeholders also have time please plan to attend one of the YFHS club meetings at any health facility which normally happen on Saturdays. Next quarter, PYAO's priority is to monitor all YFHS clubs in the district.

I am very impressed with the way the youths have conducted the community scorecards in different projects and services during this quarter. It is evident that if given full support, they can support ADCs and VDCs in holding duty bearers to account. Let's support these youth leaders technically and financially for them to continue public expenditure tracking initiatives.

I cannot go without talking about International Youth Day. 2021 had a very good theme "Transforming Food Systems: Youth Innovation for Human and Planetary Health". Community leaders empowered in ending violence

halombe Youth Arms Organisation has empowered community stakeholders in Sub Traditional Authority Nyambalo have been to take role in ending intimate partner violence.

Intimate partner violence is common among families in this area according to survey that was conducted by Art and global health Africa in 2020.

PYAO Programmes officer Stanford Chidule said the activity aimed at telling the community members effects of intimate partner violence so that the vice be curbed.

"We engaged four chiefs and their VDC members, child protection workers, community police forum, in Sub TA Nyambalo discussing what they as leaders can do to end the intimate partner violence here.

"Gender Balance Tree and songs were used to help the leaders were empowered to take leading roles," he said.

In his remarks, Sub Traditional Authority Nyambalo advised all the 4 chiefs to conduct the awareness through community meetings so that this message should reach out to all families in the area.

"Take advantage of your community meetings and disseminate these messages so that the intimate partner violence should be curbed," said the Chief.

He further hailed PYAO for the activity saying there is need to be having such interfaces frequently in the area.

PYAO conducted the activity with support from Art and Global Health Africa through the project Malawi Art for Women Activism (MAWA).

Among those present at the meeting were council's chairperson and chairpersons of different service committees such as health, development, education, finance and environment.

Speaking during the interface, the council chairperson Benard Komwa promised that some of the issues presented will be deliberated during forthcoming Council meetings.

"We are happy that you invited us to tell us matters affecting your fellow youths, this meeting is very fruitful as it has reminded us what we were missing so as to address issues affecting you (youths). I

halombe district council has "Let me promise you that whatever has affecting the youths in the district forthcoming full council meetings, we don't want you to be left behind, you are the key to the development anywhere here in Phalombe district," he said.

> One of the youth champions who was present at the event, Successor Isaac, said he is happy to see how the council's representatives responded to the matters presented them.

"In many cases they gave us answers which we wanted, they weren't stingy with information, look they even told us that some of the things we are asking them can't be fulfilled easily because of their poor relationship with their respective members of Parliament," said Isaac who is also chairperson for Phweremwe Youth Network.

In his remarks, PYAO Executive Director Vincent Thom applauded the council's representatives for giving audience to the youths and he was quick to remind them their pledge of taking these issues to a full council meeting.

"It was very important interface, look both sides are satisfied with resolutions made, we are looking forward for these councillors to fulfill their pledge and we are sure that the council will do something on what has been deliberated here" he said.

Among the issues are lack of youth corners in health facilities. Gender Based Violence (GBV), human trafficking, among others.



In his remarks Programmes' Officer for PYAO, Stanford Chidule, said the organisation is keen to support activities which aim to unearth gaps that can be bridged for the betterment of livelihood of the youths.

ommunity Policing Forum members at Njalo Island have been equipped with skills of handling matters of children rights protection on the Island.

The two-day training covering topics such as Violence Against Women, Girls and Children, Child Labour, Child, Early and Forced Marriages, Drug and Substance Abuse.

PYAO Programmes Officer Stanford Chidule said the training was held upon the request of the chief Chalera of the Island who noted a knowledge gap among policing forum members.

"We wanted to empower the Community Policing Team so as to be enforcing the acts of protecting the child, preventing them from early and forced marriages while understanding the child related rights," he said.

Chidule added that together with officers from Phalombe Police and Social Welfare through the two days they had been on the Island they noted a lot of issues which need to be addressed.

"this island does not have a health centre except the under-five clinic which is managed by only a single Health Surveillance Assistant. There is no Early Childhood Development (ECD) or main school. Although some people, mostly fishermen, just come for s short period of time, there are people whose main home is this island, they were born and grown up there.

"Life at Njalo is very bad in the sense that there is legal illiteracy of child related rights and laws, high Sexually Transmitted Infections prevalence approximately more than 75% prevalence," he added.

Assistant Social Welfare Officer for the district Biton Mpilisi said children on the Island need to be assisted with an ECD centre.

"We have seen the problem, we need an ECD centre for these kids to be playing their while learning some basics of a child," he said.

On his part Village Head Chalera commended PYAO saying the training is an eye opener and he promised that they will be arresting those who violate rights of the children, girls and women on the Island and face the law.

"My men and women have now acquired the knowledge which they needed, with the encouragement we have received from the officers who were here we've now gained a momentum and let me say here that we will never entertain all people who violate rights of our children who hold the future of this Island," said the chief.







PYAO motivates Mlambe Girls



halombe Youth Arms Organisation has encouraged Adolescent Girls and Young Women (AGYWs) to be vigilant in ending sexual and gender based violence (SGBV) in the area of traditional authority Chiwalo.

Speaking after visiting the AGYWs who are known by their Mlambe Girls Club, Executive Director for PYAO Vincent Thom advised the girls to guard each other.

"You need to be safeguarding rights of your fellow girls here. Whenever you hear that your colleague somewhere is being abused and her rights are being violated please do not hesitate to play a role in protecting her," he said.

Thom added that by telling the girls that they should be encouraging fellow girls to be taking contraceptives so as to avoid unwanted pregnancies and early marriages

The club's chairperson, Racheal Matemba, thanked PYAO for the visit saying her fellow girls have learnt a few things which will be very useful in their day to day activities.

"We are happy for these kind of support, we'll continue doing the good work as you know apart from discussing issues of sexual and reproductive health we do also work as watchdogs for child and human trafficking as you know this area is the traffickers' route," she said.

Mlambe Girls Club has more than 20 members both in school and out school girls as through the club are able to discuss matters affecting their day to day lives.

Youths Speak Out



Efridah Mangwanda from Namba Youth Club

Efridah says through PYAO's interventions she is now fully aware how to advocate for transparency and accountability from leaders of different committees at community level.

Through various trainings on advocacy and budget trafficking using scorecards, Efridah can now be able to track how funds are used by Village Development Committee of her village.

"Tracking how our taxes are being used by village development committee is no longer an issue as we always make sure that every 1 Malawi Kwacha counts.

"Advocating for our rights is also no longer an issue, whenever we feel that somehow our rights have been violated we stand up and do something," said Efrida.

Personally, Efridah says through knowledge and skills acquired from PYAO interventions she is able to do things determinedly and independently.

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Wyson Luka from Nazombe Youth Club

"The list of good things is too long which PYAO is doing to us here in Phalombe," says Wyson who is also the chairperson for Phalombe district youth network.

According to Wyson most of leaders of the youth clubs across the district have the capacity in matters of Sexual Reproductive Health and Services (SRHS), advocacy on matters of seeking transparency and accountability.

"Youths of Phalombe today can't be deceived on various matters because of capacity which PYAO has built in them from advocacy up to implementing matters on the ground.

"Look with support and mentorship from PYAO, youths of Phalombe advocated for construction of youth resource centres, I can say now that Jenala Youth Resource Centre is nearly its completion stage and Mpasa Youth Resource Centre is about to start," he said.

The chairperson added that youths living with HIV/AIDS are now coming openly and join the Y-plus networks in all the traditional authorities where they discuss matters that concern them most.

"Look our Y-plus clubs are vibrant now because of interventions by PYAO, we are very grateful for the support," said the chairperson. "Youths of Phalombe today can't be deceived on various matters because of capacity which PYAO has built in them from advocacy up to implementing matters on the ground.

Laston who is the chairperson for Kaduya Youth Network says through PYAO interventions youths are now meeting in the health facilities of Kalinde and Migowi as part of youth friendly health services.

He says PYAO has helped a lot in reducing teenage pregnancies and early marriages as the organisation has been making sure that contraceptive methods through YCBD As are always available to the youths.

Laston said: "If you come every Saturday at Migowi health centre you will be surprised with number of youths that you will find, many youths come and meet their colleagues and get help for sexual and reproduction health services and rights. "I can challenge people to go and see Kalinde health centre on how it is performing in YFHS, all this because of PYAO." The youth champion adds that due to capacity in SRHR enhanced by PYAO most youth clubs are determined to make sure that teenage pregnancies are prevented.

"From Chiwalo Youth Network we are very grateful with PYAO, advocacy and Sexual Reproductive Health Rights trainings (SRHR) have built our capacity here," said Racheal.

Racheal who is also chairperson for Mlambe Girls Club says PYAO has reduced teenage pregnancies in their area through trainings which YCBDAs received as they now able to give out some contraceptive methods which at first were being offered only at Nambazo Health Centre in the area. She added that through advocacy skills which they received they are able to advocate to issues of prot ection of children in the area who are prone to human trafficking.

Chief bemoans increase in teenage pregnancies

but-traditional Authority Phweremwe of Phalombe district has expressed concern over the increase in teenage pregnancy cases in the area, saying many girls are being impregnated by men from Mozambique.

The chief said this during an interface of different stakeholders on how to curb the teenage pregnancies in his area organised by Phalombe Youth Arms Organisation (PYAO).

In an interview, the chief said men from Mozambique cross over to his area and engage in sexual affairs with teenage girls.

"Most of these teenage pregnancies are fathered by Mozambican men as you know we're just meters away as my area borders with the Mozambique.

"I think due to lack of role models these girls drop out from school and they indulge themselves in sexual malpractices with these Mozambican men, government and other stakeholders should help us," he said.

In his remarks, Child Protection Officer for the area, Charles Sipuni, said most of these teenage pregnancies are coming because of negligence of parents who fail to control these girls.

"Parents are not taking part in protecting the children here, they do not control their movements, there is need that parents should change their mindsets and be responsible," he said. In a separate interview, PYAO Executive Director, Vincen Thom, said the interface was important as now stakeholders are on the same page on reasons of increase in teenage pregnancies.

"Going forward, we'll be able to formulate reasonable ways as a district, of how we can deal with the increase in teenage pregnancies, our girls need to be in school not in marriages," he said.

Last year, 2,784 cases of teen pregnancies and 800 child marriages were recorded in Phalombe over a period of six months following closure of schools.


